# IT'S A WIN-WIN!

*YARD DEBRIS CARTS: You asked; now you have the option!*



There has been much discussion about providing yard debris carts for Aumsville residents as part of their garbage service package. After the city's survey and resident comments, Aumsville City Council (ACC) worked with Republic Services to create the yard program that meets the needs of all their customers. **ACC consensus was to proceed with approval of the residential package changes proposed by Republic Services to provide yard debris carts for all CUSTOMERS WHO WANT THEM at an additional \$3.90 monthly rate. Those CUSTOMERS WHO DO NOT WANT A YARD DEBRIS COLLECTION CART DELIVERED SIMPLY NOTIFY REPUBLIC SERVICES BY JUNE 1<sup>ST</sup>, so the cart is not delivered to their address.** Republic is creating a billing insert for the April 30 billing cycle. Customers will receive information on how to opt out, and, once again, will be reminded to do so by June 1<sup>st</sup> to avoid the additional \$3.90 fee.

**THE CHOICE IS YOURS: *If you want a yard debris cart delivered, do nothing, Republic Services has your recycling covered! If you do not want yard debris pick-up, simply call 503.981.1278 or follow the instructions in your billing insert.*** Republic Services will not start the yard debris service program until the first of June to allow residents time to opt out.

**has your recycling covered! If you do not want yard debris pick-up, simply call 503.981.1278 or follow the instructions in your billing insert.** Republic Services will not start the yard debris service program until the first of June to allow residents time to opt out.

**Here is the other good news** for those that wanted seasonal service. For Aumsville residents that participate in yard debris service and have had a cart on site for at least 6 months, they may call the customer service department and put a Seasonal Stop on yard debris service. (This is for yard debris service only.) The cart will NOT be removed, but remain on site, as service will automatically resume three months (or sooner if the customer desires) after the stop was initiated. The Opt Out program allows for

seasonal stops for yard debris because there is a stand-alone charge for the service. This would make Aumsville unique among all other franchises and proves once again that Aumsville is a GREAT place to live. It also shows that Republic Services cares about their customers!

**Remember you MUST CALL Republic Services to opt out of the delivery of yard debris carts in June. Calls to city hall will not stop the \$3.90 yard debris charge to your residential rate package!**

## What Does a Mayor Do?

Mayors have been around since 14th Century England and are at the head of the 242 incorporated cities in Oregon, from Portland (pop. 601,510) to Greenhorn (pop. 2). The mayor is the most prominent elected official in these municipal governments all across Oregon. There is only one mayor, one person who is the leader for the community, elected by the people – or in a few cases appointed by their city’s councilors – to hold the top spot in their local governments.

In their topmost spot, a mayor is the figurehead for the city, painting the picture of the culture, style, ideas and image of their community – what it is and what it wants to be. How does the community look at itself and what does it see? Mayors read these signs and share this imagery with the world. They, better

than anyone, have their finger on the pulse of their communities and “get it.” Thus, the mayor is the primary spokesperson for the city and its most visible image.

Routinely, mayors preside over the elected city councils in their cities. Like a chairman of the board, they structure the meetings, bringing city business to the table and executing it with honor, integrity and dispatch, typically with good humor. Councils meet frequently and cover a wide range of community business including making the city’s laws and regulations. Some mayors vote along with the council, others simply preside, but typically can veto important laws called ordinances.

Mayors are collaborative, working together through such organizations as the Oregon Mayors Association as well as coordinating closely with the leadership of other cities, counties and the State of Oregon. Though their work is important and time-consuming, almost all mayors in Oregon serve their communities as unpaid volunteers, as do their councils.

Mayors often give an annual “State of the City” address to the community, summing up the consequential events of the preceding year. This represents a report card on the city. What mattered? What changed? How were problems faced? And finally, what opportunities and challenges lie ahead in the new year and how will they be addressed? So the mayor is a busy person, an important person, but important and busy only in the service of the citizens of his or her community. Mayors bring ideas, energy and wisdom together at the top to make their communities a better place to live, better for all.

**GENERAL RULES:** (First-place statewide winners will receive their prizes during the OMA Summer Conference, to be held July 21-23, 2016 in Lincoln City.)

- All submissions must be accompanied by a completed entry form. All forms for students under age 18 must be signed by the student’s parent or guardian. Entry forms may be photocopied.
- Only one submission per student will be accepted at the state level and becomes the property of the OMA.
- OMA retains the right to publish state-level entries along with the names and likenesses of each student.

3. **ESTABLISH EMERGENCY CONTACTS:** Practice evacuating your home. Determine two meeting places where your family will reunite.
4. **IDENTIFY AN OUT OF AREA EMERGENCY CONTACT:** Instruct family to check in with them during emergencies and if separated.
5. **KNOW WHEN AND HOW:** to turn off water, electricity and gas
6. **KNOW EMERGENCY PROCEDURES:** in your workplace and for your children's schools.

Reserves worked a total of 288.8 hours during the month of February: 228 volunteer hours and 60.5 paid hours.





A public hearing on the Subdivision and Variance applications for property at 7591 Bishop Road, Aumsville, Oregon has been set before the Aumsville City Council for **Monday, April 11, 2016 at 7:00 PM**. The hearing will be held in the Chester Bridges Memorial Community Center, 555 Main Street, Aumsville. The applications have been filed by Jerry Flowers Enterprises, Inc. to subdivide 20.17 acres of property located on Map 81W30A, Tax Lot 1500 as permitted by Section 20.00 of The Development Ordinance. The Variance Application requests that the lots have less than the required 70-foot width/frontage.

The applicable criteria for the applications are set forth as follows:

**Section 20.45 – Subdivision Decision Criteria:**

Approval of a subdivision request shall require compliance with the following decision criteria:

- (A) The overall dwelling density shall be consistent with policies contained in the Comprehensive Plan.
- (B) Each lot shall satisfy the dimensional standards of applicable zoning district (Section 5.00), unless a variance from these standards is approved.
- (C) Adequate public facilities including transportation shall be available to serve the newly created lots and transportation shall be coordinated with the school district. The subdivision shall comply with applicable requirements of Section 22.15 Transportation Impacts.
- (D) The subdivision shall comply with the applicable design criteria in Section 20.70.

**Section 13.04 - Variance Decision Criteria:**

A variance from the terms of the ordinance shall not be granted unless ALL of the following circumstances exist:

- (A) Compliance with the applicable requirement or standard of this ordinance would:
  - 1. Create a hardship due to one or more of the following conditions:
    - (a) The physical characteristics of the land, improvements, or uses that are not typical of conditions in the zoning district; or
    - (b) Such variance is necessary for the preservation and enjoyment of a substantial property right of the applicant possessed by the owners of other properties in the same vicinity or district; or
    - (c) That the special conditions and circumstances on which the application is based do not result from the negligent or knowing violation of this ordinance by the applicant.
  - 2. Not be materially detrimental to the public welfare or injurious to property in the vicinity or district in which property is located.
- (B) Strict adherence to the requirement or standard is unnecessary because the proposed variance will reasonably satisfy both of the following objectives:
  - 1. Granting the variance will not create significant adverse affects to the appearance, function, or safety of the use or uses on the subject property; and
  - 2. Granting the variance will not impose limitations on other properties in the area, including uses which would be allowed on vacant or underdeveloped properties.
- (C) Approval of this application will allow the property to be used only for the purposes authorized by the zoning district.

A copy of the applications, all documents and evidence submitted by or on behalf by the applicants, and applicable criteria are available for inspection at no cost and will be provided at a per-copy cost at least 20 days prior to the public hearing. A copy of any staff report will be available for inspection at no cost at least 7 days prior to the hearing and a copy will be available at a per-copy cost. Additional information may be obtained from Lora Hofmann, Administrative Assistant at (503) 749-2030 and written testimony must be directed to her attention, for the public record, at city hall, 595 Main Street, Aumsville, Oregon 97325, or at the hearing.

Written and verbal testimony is to be directed toward the criteria and anyone wishing to testify should sign in and ask to be recognized by the Mayor. Failure to raise issue in person or by letter prior to the close of the public hearing with sufficient specificity to provide the Aumsville City Council opportunity to respond to the issue, precludes appeal to the Land Use Board of Appeals on this issue.

# Intellectual and Developmental Disability Awareness

My fellow commissioners and I recently proclaimed March as Intellectual and Developmental Disability Awareness Month. While this is an important topic in our community, it is personally significant to me and my family. On our monthly television program, Marion County

TODAY, I shared the story of my granddaughter Caroline who lives with 5p- (Five P Minus) Syndrome also called Cri du Chat. It means that a portion of her number five chromosome is missing. Caroline is the highlight of my life and I shared her story to raise awareness of available services and challenges faced by people living with disabilities.

When my granddaughter was first diagnosed, the outlook was not good. We were told that she would likely never experience a full quality of life. Well, the Brentanos are fighters and we learned that with the right interventions and therapy Caroline could thrive. She's experienced many accomplishments, a few setbacks, and through it all, is a happy little girl who adds immensely to our family.

The Marion County Health Department provides a variety of services including case management to children and adults with developmental disabilities and is one component in a wide array of services. Additional service providers include the Oregon Department of Human Services, Northwest Senior and Disability Services, school districts, and various non-profits offering specialized services. Navigating this complex system can be challenging, especially for families of those newly diagnosed.

Last fall I attended a community discussion by Oregon Developmental Disabilities Services with my daughter Sarah, Caroline's mother. They explained recent changes in the system and some of the challenges families have experienced obtaining services. A common challenge is the lack of case workers to advise families and coordinate care. As more children become eligible for services, the corresponding funding has not increased adequately to cover necessary services. At that time, there was no organization to oversee the entire range of services for clients and their families.

My daughter has been a tireless advocate for Caroline. Through Sarah's persistence, Caroline recently started a new therapy focusing on her mobility. The results have been dramatic. In just a short time, Caroline went from having no interest in using her walker to tooling around the house like a race car driver. Through this process we learned there can be many obstacles to obtaining services. We learned that fewer than 4% of eligible clients that have the highest need, like Caroline, are receiving a full complement of services.

My intention is not to criticize, but instead to make people aware of the need in our community and ensure that people understand the real difference the right services make in the life of someone with a disability. Marion County's Intellectual and Developmental Disability program goal is to coordinate with federal, state and local agencies to put together individualized plans that give children and adults the best chance of success with the resources available. I thank them for their dedicated advocacy of these special community members and look forward to the day when funding isn't an issue.

## AUMSVILLE HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWS

Aumsville Historical Society met on Thur., Mar. 10<sup>th</sup>. President Ted Shepard introduced Tim Rice of Aumsville's Recology Organics Aumsville facility on 11<sup>th</sup> Street. The parent company operates 116 locations in Washington, Oregon, California and Nevada. It originated in San Francisco many years ago when an Italian immigrant began garbage collection using burlap bags. Tim, who lives in Mollala, began work in Aumsville in 2008. At that time, the finished compost was piled as high as a six-story building and the neighbors were unhappy with the smell.

Since then, the composting techniques have been improved. The raw, shredded material is formed into long, low ridges which are equipped with pipes to inject oxygen. The internal temperature increases as microbes


decompose the material. When the temperature rises above 130 degrees, rainwater from holding ponds is used to cool it. Residents can bring plant waste to the facility, but most of the raw material being processed comes by truck from other areas. Compost is available for purchase and residents can obtain one cubic yard free at designated times. The compost is used at the community garden. Residents can help themselves to small amounts from a supply pile there. Members thanked Tim for managing this good neighbor operation.

After a refreshment break, Ted held the business meeting. Some new museum acquisitions were displayed. The old Aumsville City Hall sign has been hung in the museum. Winter work, such as filing and indexing, was done by Ted with the assistance of Linda

Mills and Karla Kliever. Karla's husband, Charles, has recently retired from the US Navy and was present at the meeting. Aumsville City Councilor, Nico Casarez, was also present. He encouraged public participation in the planning of park improvements.

The Next AHS meeting will be held at 7 PM on April 14th in the community center.

# April is Alcohol Awareness Month

This year's theme is "Talk Early, Talk Often: Parents Can Make a Difference in Teen Alcohol Use."



Alcohol use by young people is extremely dangerous—both to themselves and to society, and is directly associated with traffic fatalities, violence, suicide, educational failure, alcohol overdose, unsafe sex and other problem behaviors, even for those who may never develop a dependence or addiction. Adolescence is a time of heightened risk-taking and as alcohol and drugs enter the picture, parents are faced with a unique set of challenges. They can simply sit back and hope their kids will "get through it," or they can take an active role in learning about alcohol and drugs and helping their kids do the same.

It can be daunting to talk with children about drinking and drug use, but it is well worth the effort parents put into it. In fact, research has shown that kids who have conversations with their parents and learn a lot about the dangers of alcohol and drug use are 50% less likely to use these substances than those who don't have such conversations.

Alcohol and drug use is a very risky business for young people and parents can make a difference. The longer children delay drinking and drug use, the less likely they are to develop any problems associated with it. That's why it is so important to help your child make smart decisions about alcohol and drugs.

## What are some signs that my teenager might be using alcohol or drugs?

**Academic changes:** Dramatic drop in grades or in the ability or willingness to do school work; skipping school

**Social changes:** Developing new friends but unwilling to introduce them to family; lack of interest in previously enjoyed activities; decreased attention to physical appearance or cleanliness

**Behavior changes:** More forgetful, distracted, jittery, or aggressive; secretive behavior (e.g., locking bedroom door, lying about where they go, sneaking out of the house); increase in borrowing money from family or friends; stealing money; dramatic changes in eating and/or sleeping patterns

**Attitude changes:** Significant drop in motivation; withdrawal from responsibilities; being less cooperative



**REGULAR MEETING MINUTES  
MARCH 14, 2016**

Mayor White called the meeting to order at 7:03 PM in the Aumsville Community Center. Council present were Mayor Harold White, Councilors Robert Baugh, Jr; Nico Casarez, Brian Czarnik, Della Seney and Lorie Walters. Council absent was Councilor Trina Lee. City Administrator Maryann Hills was also present.

**VISITORS:** Nancy Boyer, Mid-Willamette Valley COG reviewed the process and schedule for the City Administrator Recruitment with council. She asked for input from council on the recruitment profile and reviewed the profile categories.

Mayor White said a priority would be a person that is relational with different groups of people. Councilor Walters noted that she has come to expect with City Administrator Hills good future planning and vision, and attention to detail. Councilor Casarez noted the importance of a strong collaborative attitude, personable, strong knowledge of land use planning, enthusiastic and reaching out to various community groups. Councilor Czarnik stated the need for someone that has a grasp on small city issues. Councilor Seney asked for a good communicator, and Mayor White added budget and investing skills and finance knowledge. Councilor Baugh stated that he would like the candidates to have experience and not be a first time city administrator, that they have financial experience, and the scope of multiple divisions. Ms. Boyer stated for a city of Aumsville’s size that may be a challenge and asked if council would be ok with someone without a prior city management position. She shared that it could be that they would have private sector management experience or other local government background experience, and it was discussed. Mayor White questioned the recruitment minimal qualifications and preferred qualifications, and discussion of the options for education and experience followed. Ms. Boyer handed out a City of Carlton City Manager Profile for council to review and consider and it was discussed. Councilor Baugh questioned the background check process and it was discussed. Ms. Boyer shared her process of checking references. She shared the city staff profile input she received at a recent TEAM meeting and council considered it. Ms. Boyer stated that the interview candidates will get a copy of the budget for review beforehand. Ms. Boyer noted that she will be on the next council meeting agenda for their approval of the recruitment profile and schedule.

**PUBLIC HEARING: CITY ZONE CHANGE APPLICATION – 640 and 650 5<sup>th</sup> Street**

Mayor White opened the hearing and read the Hearing Disclosure Statement, there were no Declaration of Interests. City Administrator Hills presented the Aumsville Planning Commission recommendation to approve the Zone Change

with adoption of the findings in the February 11, 2016 Staff Report. She reviewed the staff report findings, conclusion and recommended council approval of this zone change from Residential Multi-Family zoning to Public for the Wildwood Park addition. There being no testimony, rebuttal or questions, on this city application, the public hearing was closed at 7:44 PM.

Council Deliberations and Decision - Council moved that council approve the zone change and adopt the findings in the staff report, and the motion passed unanimously.

**CONTRACT REVIEW BOARD:** Council approved the David Kinney City Administrator Pro-tem Employment Agreement unanimously.

**CORRESPONDENCE:** Council received a Federal Emergency Management Agency Special Flood Hazard Letter. City Administrator Hills informed council that the city engineer was also given a copy of the letter for comments and she clarified the Letter of Map Revision documents enclosed were for the 317 South 5<sup>th</sup> Street Mill Creek Apartments Building K and Building L. Councilor Seney said that their engineer is correcting the Special Flood Hazard Area map to remove these buildings and it was discussed. Council took no action.

Council received the letter from Aumsville resident Kristy Sugg regarding her Canyon Area Regional Transportation System (CARTS) route changes concerns. Councilor Casarez stated that he directed Ms. Sugg to write the letter and council proposed getting a copy to Cherriots. Councilor Czarnik reported that the route to Gates is back on the table and it was interesting to find out that a majority of the riders in the upper canyon are in Linn County. He noted that the consultant's report advises contacting Linn County for a route funding share, and it was discussed. Councilor Czarnik shared that what has been proposed is keeping the Route 30 through Aumsville as it is and then adding an express route from Stayton to Salem. City Administrator Hills reported that she has requested that Aumsville be included in the

express route to Salem instead of limiting it to only Stayton residents and it was considered. The Route 35 Dial a Ride was questioned and Councilor Czarnik confirmed its elimination, and it was discussed. The CARTS changes, including Route 30 as a deviated route, are still going to public meeting for comments and discussion. The public meeting has yet to be scheduled. Councilor Baugh stated that he would hate to see the baby thrown out with the bath water and does not want decades of transportation work to be changed now. Mayor White discussed the Federal and State grant funding that has provided for the CARTS service since its development. Councilor Seney reported that the Mid-Willamette Valley Commission on Transportation is not supporting the proposed changes, and they were discussed.

Council received a letter requesting a donation to 2016 Cascade Senior Drug and Alcohol Free Graduation Party and it was considered. City Administrator Hills informed council that the city has not giving any donations since the last economic downturn when they were eliminated as a deficit reduction act. The former Cascade sports advertising support was discussed in comparison to \$250 banner logo donation cost. Council discussed a \$150 donation and Councilor Czarnik asked if it would also be helpful for them to put a fundraising ad in the newsletter; and it was considered. Council consensus was to give a \$150 donation and offer newsletter articles to aid their fundraising.

**POLICE REPORT:** Council received Chief Schmitz's Monthly Report. Mayor White reported Police Officer Gollinger's graduation from the police academy this month, and that our sixth Officer Largent has now started the police academy; and it was discussed.

**PUBLIC WORKS REPORT:** Council received Public Works Director Osie's Monthly Report Mayor White discussed with council the sewer line issue with the re-drilling of the Tower Well project, he would like it to be grandfathered in and the likelihood of it was considered. The rule change has delayed the project and now the well

may have to be relocated. Councilor Casarez discussed the challenges with the elevated Tower water tank in the event of an earthquake with council. City Administrator Hills noted that the Water Tower telecommunication leases are what fund city park's operating expenses and it was considered.

**UNFINISHED BUSINESS:**

Council received City Administrator Staff Report – Aumsville Yard Debris Program and discussed it with her. They celebrated the win/win recommendation. Their consensus was to proceed with adoption of the new residential rates in an updated Republic Services resolution at their next regular meeting. Mayor White asked that the options be communicated clear in the newsletter up to the June deadline.

City Administrator Hills reviewed the copy of Aumsville's Mission Statement with council and discussed its incorporation into the Marketing

Brochure Template Response Form. They reviewed the Template Option #3 draft and corrected Donald typo under Local Business Resources.

**NEW BUSINESS:**

Council received the Transportation System Development Charge (TSDC) Revised Calculation Worksheet information and it was discussed in length. Council consensus was to support the usage of the updated 2016 calculation tool, and not to proceed with the Marion County grant for the future 1<sup>st</sup> & Main signal at this time.

Council reviewed and discussed the AT&T Cell Site Lease Optimization offer documents, noting that it would be reducing their current lease. Council consensus was no action at this time.

**ADJOURNMENT:** Council adjourned without objection at 9:40 PM.
