Mayor's Message

The City Council has been busy the past few weeks going through applications that have been submitted to the Council of Governments and the City for the position of City Administrator.

On June 13th, four of the candidates were invited to the City, and three interview panels made up of City Council, a community panel, and city staff met with each candidate.

At 10:00 AM, City Administrator Pro-tem David Kinney and I took the candidates on a tour of the city, beginning with City Hall. City Clerk Colleen Rogers gave them the tour of City Hall and Police Chief Richard Schmitz gave a tour of the Police Department. Public Works Director Steve Osie gave a tour of our new water treatment plant, the public works shops, and waste-water treatment. We also went to Wildwood Splash Park. We then took them to Porter-Boone Park, at the time our Summer Reading and Recreation program was in session. City Administrative Assistant Lora Hofmann explained the program to the candidates. The candidates were able to have a break and some food before the interview sessions began.

The panel interviews began at 1:00 PM and ended at 5:00 PM. City Council met with members of the community and city staff interview panels to discuss their opinions. Then, at 6:00 PM, we had a community open house at the community center, so the public would have the opportunity to meet candidates.

Following the open house, City Council went into our scheduled council meeting and Public Hearing to discuss and approve the 2016-2017 Fiscal Year Budget and State Revenue Sharing funds. Following the council meeting, we went into Executive Session to discuss the candidates and the interview panels' input; there was no decision made. The council decided to have an executive session on June 23rd. As of the writing of this article, the council hasn't met, but we will keep you informed of Council's progress and decisions.

Soon we will be celebrating our National Independence Day! Daniel Webster said; *"Let our object be our country, our whole country, and nothing but our country. And by the blessing of God may that country itself be a vast and splendid monument, not of oppression and terror, but of wisdom, of peace, and of liberty, upon which the world may gaze with admiration forever."*

Marion County Budget Highlights

Adopting the annual budget is one of the most important responsibilities for county government. The budget is a policy document, which establishes the operational plan for delivering programs and services to county residents and one-time investments. With the adoption of the budget, the Board of Commissioners establishes the funding priorities for the upcoming year and strategic direction in to the future.

On June 2, I opened Marion County Budget Committee hearings with the annual Budget Officer's Message. Over the following days, departments presented their budgets to the Budget Committee for approval and the commissioners formally adopted the fiscal Year 2016-17 budget on June 22. County staff went above and beyond to deliver a budget that responsibly invests public funds for essential public services.

With an improving economy, the FY 2016-17 Marion County Budget sustains existing programs and continues our infrastructure renewal. The total adopted budget for FY 2016-17 is \$387,985,501 with a General Fund of \$88,473,600.

The commissioners' priority is public safety, which receives 78% of general fund operating revenue. This includes funding for the Sheriff's Office, District Attorney's Office, Juvenile Department, and Justice Court. This year we will add additional staff in the District Attorney's Office and Juvenile Department, as well as a Patrol Deputy for the North Santiam Canyon.

We are looking forward to completion of renovations at the Health building which will reopen this fall. The board has also approved four major capital projects at two campuses. Over the next few years, we will add a new Central District Office for the Sheriff's Office patrol division, replace the Parole & Probation building, add a new Juvenile Courtroom and remodel the Juvenile Administration Building.

The 2016-17 budget also provides for a variety of equipment purchases and upgrades including a replacement for the District Attorney's Case Management System and a new ballot sorter for Elections which will streamline sorting and signature verification.

These are just a few highlights from our budget. With 15 departments and more than 1,400 full-time employees, it's impossible to cover everything. I encourage you to the review the full Budget Message and the FY 2016-17 budget, which is posted on the county website at www.co.marion.or.us/BOC/budget. Notice of Receipt of Ballot Title Prohibits Marijuana Registrants and Licensees in the City of Aumsville

At the June 27, 2016 City Council meeting the Aumsville City Council voted to place on the November 8, 2016 General Election a ballot measure to prohibit certain marijuana registrants and licensees in the City of Aumsville, Oregon.

Notice of Receipt of Ballot Title

Notice is hereby given that a ballot title for a City Council referred measure was filed with the Elections Officer of the City of Aumsville on June 27, 2016.

Electors may submit a petition for review of this ballot title in the Marion County Circuit Court no later than 5:00 p.m. on July 7, 2016.

The text of the ballot title is as follows:

CAPTION: Prohibit marijuana registrants and licensees in the City of Aumsville

QUESTION: Shall the city of Aumsville prohibit medical marijuana processors, medical marijuana dispensaries, recreational marijuana producers, processors, wholesalers, and retailers?

SUMMARY: State law allows operation of registered medical marijuana processors, medical marijuana dispensaries and licensed recreational marijuana producers, processors, wholesalers, and retailers. State law provides that a city council may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters to prohibit the establishment of any of those registered or licensed activities.

Approval of this measure would prohibit the establishment and operation of medical marijuana processors, medical marijuana dispensaries, recreational marijuana producers, processors, wholesalers, and retailers within the area subject to the jurisdiction of the City of Aumsville.

If this measure is approved, the city will be ineligible to receive distributions of state marijuana tax revenues and will be unable to impose a local tax or fee on the production, processing or sale of marijuana or any product into which marijuana has been incorporated.

Notice is also hereby given that a regular city election will be held in the City of Aumsville on November 8, 2016.

Recology Organics Site Development Review Application
8712 Aumsville Highway SE, Salem OR

A public hearing for the site development review application has been set before the Aumsville Planning Commission on **Thurs., July 21, 2016, 6:00 PM**, at the community center, 555 Main St. in the City of Aumsville.

The application has been filed by **Recology Organics** to install site improvements to the active composting area, the compost curing area, and to relocate the maintenance shop to provide more space for phase II composting; on property located at 8712 Aumsville Highway SE, Salem, Oregon, as permitted by Section 21.00 of The Development Ordinance.

21.06 SITE DEVELOPMENT REVIEW – APPROVAL CRITERIA: The review authority shall make written findings with respect to all of the following criteria when approving, approving with conditions, or denying an application:

1. The application is complete, as determined in accordance with Section 12.02 and Section 21.05;
2. The application complies with all applicable provisions of the underlying land use zone, including: building and yard setbacks, lot area and dimensions, lot coverage, and other special standards as may be required for certain land uses;
3. Characteristics of adjoining and surrounding uses;
4. The application complies with the supplementary zone regulations contained in Sections 18.00, 19.00, and 22.00;
5. Conditions required as part of a land division (Section 20.00), conditional uses (Section 14.00), or other approval shall be met;
6. Provision for adequate noise and/or visual buffering from non-compatible uses;
7. Drainage and erosion control needs;
8. Public health factors;
9. Problems that may arise due to development within potential hazard area; and
10. Retention of existing natural features on site.

A copy of the applications, all documents and evidence submitted by, or on behalf by the applicants, and applicable criteria are available for inspection at Aumsville City Hall for free or may be requested at a per copy cost with a public record request form.. A copy of any staff report will be available for inspection at no cost at least 7 days prior to the hearing. Additional information may be obtained from Lora Hofmann, Administrative Assistant or City Administrator Pro Tem David Kinney at (503) 749-2030 and written testimony must be directed to their attention, for the public record, at city hall, 595 Main Street, Aumsville, Oregon 97325, or at the hearing.

The meeting location is accessible for persons with disabilities. A request for an interpreter for the hearing impaired, or for other accommodations must be made at least 48 hours prior to the meeting. Emergency Preparedness Corner



Welcome Summer! I'm going to take a small break from discussing Emergency Preparedness/Getting Your Family and Home Ready and discuss some summertime activity-specific preparedness ideas.

It's fireworks season. Beginning June 23rd through July 6th, fireworks are approved for sale in Oregon. Fire districts throughout the county respond to an increased number of fireworks related incidents.

Protect your family and property from fireworks related fires and injuries by practicing the "Four Be's" as recommended by the Oregon State Fire Marshal's Office.

Be prepared for lighting fireworks:

- ✓ Use only legal fireworks available at licensed fireworks sales locations
- ✓ Store fireworks out of reach of children
- ✓ Read and follow the fireworks directions
- ✓ Place pets indoors; they are easily frightened by fireworks
- ✓ Always have water handy; a garden hose or a bucket of water to dispose

Be safe when lighting fireworks

- ✓ An adult should always light the fireworks
- ✓ Keep matches and lighters away from children
- ✓ Use fireworks outside only
- ✓ Light one at a time and move out of the way quickly
- ✓ Do not throw fireworks or hold in your hand

Be responsible after lighting fireworks

- ✓ Soak unused fireworks thoroughly in a bucket of water
- ✓ Dispose of used fireworks and debris properly
- ✓ Never re-light a "dud" firework; wait at least 15-20 minutes then soak in a bucket of water

Be aware of laws governing fireworks

- ✓ Use only legal fireworks
- ✓ Use fireworks only in legal places

WHAT FIREWORKS ARE ILLEGAL IN OREGON?

Bottle rockets	Missiles/rockets	M-80's

In Oregon, illegal fireworks are those that fly into the air, travel more than 12 feet horizontally on smooth surfaces, or explode or behave in an uncontrolled and unpredictable manner.

Purchase:

Canned, ready-to-eat soup
Liquid dish soap
Plain liquid bleach

Vegetables - green beans, corn, peas, beets, baked beans, carrots...

- ✓ Make photocopies of important papers and place in a storage container – include a medical information sheet on each family member
- ✓ Talk to neighbors to determine who have skills and/or training that would be beneficial in a disaster – *i.e. First-Aid, child care, amateur radio operator, tree removal, small engine repair, heavy equipment operation, wilderness survival, and carpentry...*

Driveway Access for Emergency Vehicles

Residents of the Aumsville Rural Fire District, it has become apparent over the last few years some of the private roads and driveways in the area may not be accommodating to Aumsville Rural Fire District apparatus and other emergency vehicles. This letter is a reminder to our valued residents of the importance of maintaining clear and unobstructed access to all structures within the district. It is also a reminder of the importance of having access bridges evaluated for weight capacity to accommodate the emergency vehicles that may be needed to respond to your residence.

The purpose of emergency service access is to allow emergency vehicles to approach a building as close as practical in order to deploy hoses, ladders and other equipment necessary for fire control and other operations. Firefighters are asked to respond to a multitude of emergencies in various types of buildings and locations, in all hours of the day and night, and in all types of weather conditions. Emergency responders try their best to respond to calls in a timely manner, often while negotiating narrow, winding roads and difficult terrain. Fire trucks are likely to be the largest, longest, widest and heaviest vehicles that will be driven on private road and driveways within our district. Planning for emergency vehicle access improves safety for homeowners and their families by providing a more efficient response by firefighters and other emergency personnel arriving on scene. This is especially important in the more outlying areas where response times may be considerably longer due to increased travel times. Driveways that are not wide enough to accommodate a vehicle, that have low-lying branches that block passage-way or are unable to accommodate fire apparatus weight and believed to be hazardous will not be accessed by fire

department vehicles. This can result in significant delays in response by first responders which may lead to disastrous results in the event of an emergency. It is in hopes that this notification will assist landowners, caretakers and property managers in providing the information needed to meet the requirements for fire department and ambulance access.

As existing apparatus age-out and are replaced by newer models, we find the overall weights of these vehicles are becoming increasingly larger and heavier. This is caused in part by numerous changes in emission controls brought on by way of federal legislation and the necessity to carry more equipment and water on each apparatus. These changes have forced vehicle manufacturers to increase the engine compartment size of fire apparatus in order to accommodate the necessary emission controls and body length for more storage room. This results in fire trucks that demand a clear path of travel to all emergencies.



Riverview Community Bank also provides 1000 environmentally friendly bags that are used to hold 20 ears of corn, which will sell for \$3 a bag. Riverview Community Bank has been our stalwart sponsor over the years.

Marion Soil and Water Conservation District (MSWCD) was our new sponsor in 2015, underwriting a major percentage of our corn purchase, plus conducting two classes in the Chester Bridges Memorial Community Center. MSWCD will be with us again this year, and they are working with the city to present more classes that benefit the citizens of Aumsville. They will have a booth at the festival, so stop by and say hi and see what they are doing in the county.

Hillyer's Stayton Ford is also a new sponsor coming to us in 2015. Their sponsorship is to the Aumsville Corn Festival Court, which could have a total of five princesses in 2016. Hillyer's Ford supports the court by providing funds for any school function the princesses wish to be compensated for. Hillyer's also provides funds to defray operation costs for the court throughout the year, and a vehicle for the court to ride in during the parade. Hillyer's Ford is looking to continue their support of the court in the coming years.





Thanks to Ted Shepard, the museum now has signs, which can be displayed on appropriate occasions to honor veterans. The first 2016 Aumsville 2nd Saturday Market was held on June 11th from 9 to 3. The museum was open during those hours and there were twenty five visitors. Barbara McGinnis's husband Walt donated an old police car siren which had belonged to his father. No public demonstration of the siren is planned.

Former AHS member Mable Overholts passed away on May 16th. She will be remembered for her community service in Stayton and her big smile. She was 100 years old. AHS member Jordan Pugh has graduated from McKay High. Karla

Kliewer's daughter Kalani was one of the valedictorians in Stayton High's class of 2016.

The June speaker was Jim Rasmussen of Modern Building Systems on Porter Road. He is the part of the third generation in this family business, which began in Tualatin in 1971. They design buildings for customers, construct them in sections at the Aumsville facility, transport them to the building sites, and put them together. Their smallest structures are banking kiosks. The largest is an F-22 flight simulator for Boeing, which was trucked to St. Louis and erected there.

Currently, they are building an indoor shooting range, which will be assembled at Puyallup, WA. Modern Building system moved to

Aumsville in 1992 and now employs about 130 people. Jim brought a series of aerial photos showing their facilities. Some of the space in their industrial complex is leased to other companies. Since they do business in many states, MBS must be well-informed about building codes in those locations and know the transportation laws of states they drive through. He discusses market changes and the impact of container shipping.
