If you are interested in filing as a candidate, filing forms and nomination petitions are available at city hall. **Nomination may be made by filing a declaration of candidacy, accompanied by a \$25.00 filing fee or by petition containing the signatures of not less than 25 qualified voters in the city.** The signatures must be verified by Marion County Elections before filing at city hall.

Candidacy filing forms and verified nomination petitions must be filed at city hall not later than 5:00pm on August 26, 2016.

Qualification:

- ⇒ Be a U.S. citizen, 18 years of age or older
- ⇒ Be registered to vote not less than 20 calendar days before the election
- ⇒ Reside in the city during the 12 months immediately preceding the election
- ⇒ Not be an employee or continue in any other city official position

We celebrated our volunteers' dedicated efforts on April 20 in honor of National Volunteer Week. As commissioners, we had the pleasure of presenting annual volunteer awards recognizing outstanding service to Marion County.

Please join us in congratulating our 2016 volunteer award recipients:

Youth Volunteer - Brianna Luna, Sheriff's Office Cadet Unit

The Youth Volunteer Award recognizes volunteer accomplishments of young people 24 years and under in county programs and departments. This year's recipient, Brianna Luna, is a former cadet and current intern for the Sheriff's Office Operations Division. She currently serves as a volunteer advisor with the Cadet Unit and helps plan training, meetings, and activities for cadets.

Advisory Board Volunteer - George Grabenhorst, Planning Commission

George Grabenhorst has been a member of the Planning Commission since 1997; he has served as both vice-chair and chair of the commission. It is estimated that George has served more than 500 hours on the Planning Commission reviewing subdivision applications, amendments to the Comprehensive Plan and zone codes, and special projects. George's professional yet friendly demeanor has helped create a positive teamwork approach for the other Planning Commission members and staff.

Roger's dedication was put to the test this past December when Marion County's communications tower on House Mountain lost power. Roger made several trips to the top of House Mountain to assist in getting this critical resource up and running again.

Aumsville Budget Message

FY 2016/2017

The Proposed FY 2016-2017 City of Aumsville budget will continue to fund the high quality city services that Aumsville has come to expect and rely on, while focusing on some of the projects included in the adopted Aumsville Vision document. The proposed budget of \$ 5,942,896 for the next year is a 5.2% increase over the \$5,645,631 total for the current fiscal year.

PERSONAL SERVICES

The proposed personal services costs for the City reflect several adjustments to address staffing changes, Worker's Compensation cost increases, updated health insurance rates and PERS cost increases.

Staff labor negotiations concluded with the Aumsville City Council approving step plan adjustments for three positions to bring them in line with the average against comparable cities and a 2% cost of living adjustment (COLA) for all employees.

A new City Administrator will be hired in Summer/Fall. The budget estimates the new city administrator will be hired at Step 4 of the City Administrator salary scale. The budget includes funding for city administrator pro-tem Kinney's wages until the new administrator is hired.

The Police Fund Personal Services is higher due to several factors. Chief Schmitz has successfully transitioned into his new position, and has one remaining step increase, for which he is eligible in November. A 5th and 6th police officer were hired during this year. Officer Kevin Gollinger was promoted from his recruit position as of February 1, 2016 and recruit Jordan Largent is scheduled for promotion to Police Officer on May 1, 2016, pending a positive performance evaluation. Each officer is expected to progress through the Police Officer step plan starting at Step 1.

The City/County Insurance Services (CIS) provides health insurance for city employees. CIS has announced its not-to-exceed rate increases effective January 1, 2017. Kaiser health plans will increase 9.5%, with Kaiser dental plans increasing 9.75%. Regence health plans will see a 2.5% increase next year. A little more than half of staff is currently enrolled in Kaiser health plans. CIS also announced a not-to-exceed rate increase of 7.2% for Workers' Compensation insurance premium increases. The payroll benefits line items in each fund include additional money to cover these Worker's Compensation and health insurance increases.

The Public Employee Retirement System (PERS) has provided all government employers with rate estimates for the 2017-2019 biennium. As a result of the recent Supreme Court decisions which struck down legislatively approved cost savings measures, the PERS employer rate for Aumsville is expected to increase by a little over 6% in the 2017-2019 biennium. The City will need to begin paying these costs in FY 2017-18. In anticipation, the budget includes PERS Reserve line items. We have budgeted funds to cover half of the forecasted increase. This reserve can then be used during the 2017-18 budget year when the remaining half of the cost increase will be added to complete the 2017-18 budget. Future PERS rate increases are still uncertain, but may be a significant cost to the City if the Oregon legislature is unable to adopt PERS reforms.

GENERAL FUND

The Budget estimates General Fund revenues and expenses of \$1,356,706.

The City's property tax rate of \$3.6327 per \$1,000 of property value will generate \$660,628, a 3% increase in property tax receipts. These taxes are used for the \$791,000 General Fund transfer required for the Police Fund's operating budget.

Other General Fund revenues are similar to the previous years with the following exceptions.

- State Liquor Revenue is estimated to increase to \$61,500.
- Cigarette Tax is estimated to decrease to \$4,700.

- City Fees revenue is on the rise again, thanks to new development throughout the city. This will increase the city's costs for Planning & Zoning contract services with the Mid-Willamette Valley Council of Governments.
- Court Revenue collections are expected to be higher. Police Support Specialist Campbell has transitioned well in her new position and is focused on improving collections from individuals fined in Municipal Court.

The State Revenue Sharing Apportionment remains at \$0. These revenues are assigned to the Park Fund, where they will be used for major park repairs.

Materials and Services costs are expected to be similar to prior years. The City's general liability insurance costs are expected to increase up to 9% in 2016-17, while costs for Auto Physical Damage and Property coverage will remain flat for the year.

Transfers into the General Fund include Systems Development Charge (SDC) Administrative Services Reimbursements, which reimburse the City for time spent preparing annual SDC reports. Transfers also include the utility funds' Administrative Services Reimbursement from March 2016 – February 2017 Collections.

Under Capital Outlay Building Improvements of \$20,000 is needed to repair and seal the brick & mortar at the Aumsville Museum. A sealer coat is needed to protect the soft brick. This was not completed last year as planned. The air conditioner in the Community Center may also need to be replaced at an estimated at \$6,500. The City will investigate historic preservation grant opportunities.

We have again accelerated payoff of the city hall/police complex loan. The November extra principal payment was increased from \$26,000 to \$27,000 and the extra monthly principal to \$1,300. This payment plan will pay off the loan by June 2017. Retiring this \$84,000 annual loan payment helps to solidify the budget in future years to continue funding our sixth police officer. This leaves just over 10% General Fund operating Contingency of \$124,577.

POLICE FUND

The proposed Police Fund budget is \$912,766. The City is able to meet the police department's needs with a \$791,000 transfer from the General Fund. This will provide funds for six police officers. After the new officers training is completed, the Aumsville Police Department will provide the community 24-hour law enforcement coverage by sworn officers, with the exception of extended leave and training times. Providing 24-hour coverage has been a high priority for city over the years, and we are happy to announce that it is now becoming a reality.

We have reclassified Ballistic Vests from the Capital Outlay into the Materials & Services category, as it technically does not fit the specifications for capitalization according to our financial policies. Capital Outlay line items include replacement of office chairs, and purchase of body cameras and tasers. The purpose of the \$5,000 Vehicle Replacement Fund transfer is to continue building a reserve to cover replacement of depreciated vehicles and their equipment.

PUBLIC WORKS FUNDS

WATER & SEWER FUNDS, IMPROVEMENTS FUNDS

The Water Fund & Sewer Fund revenues projections include a 4%/2% COLA rate increase which will take effect in December 2016. The continuing financial impact of our new financial software program is reflected in the Dues/Fees line item and the Major Office Equipment Reserve Fund transfer needed.

The Water Fund Maintenance & Repair budget includes annual replacement budget for meters & hydrants, as recommended in the *Aumsville Water Master Plan (WMP)*. The Public Works staff will purchase one of the six remaining fire hydrants needed. The cost of this hydrant replacement is eligible for a 14% Water SDC Fund cost-sharing. The Water Fund has a 7% Contingency of \$49,816.

Tower reservoir improvements and well rehabilitation will use an estimated \$224,000 of the Water Improvement Fund reserve money this year, along with \$22,000 in Engineering and other related services. That leaves \$50,000 reserved for Major Maintenance & Repairs; and a small \$7,243 reserved. The WMP has a list of Priority 1A Improvements, which do not have a source of funding. The next large project is to recoat the main water reservoir interior; it needs to be done soon and is estimated to cost \$360,000. Former City Administrator Maryann Hills explored funding options with Business Oregon's Infrastructure Finance Authority, but no funding package has been finalized.

In the Sewer Fund we are able to transfer \$20,000 to the Sewer Improvements Fund for needed system improvements, and leave the Contingency needed to pay a full year debt payment in December.

WATER & SEWER SDC FUNDS

In the System Development Charge (SDC) Funds, SDC's revenues are proposed on the last four lots the subdivisions currently available for development, plus ten new lots to be developed in the Clover subdivision, as well as a discount shopping center on Main Street. We will continue to save these funds for future expansion projects.

STREET FUND & TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM DEVELOPMENT CHARGE (TSDC) FUND

The S. 5th Street project, which was funded by a \$50,000 ODOT Special City Allotment Grant, has mostly been completed. The only remaining work to be done is to complete a driveway approach for a property owner on 5th and Main in fulfillment of our agreement for access during the project.

The Storm Drainage project on Cleveland to 11th Street in coordination with the Safe Routes to School Grant project is also complete. These projects expended a large portion of resources available in the Street Fund. As such, we are unable to fund any major projects for 2016-17. We will conserve resources and explore our options for funding future projects through grants or other programs.

Considering the projected SDC revenue to be generated in 2016-17, \$128,751 is estimated in the TSDC Fund saving for the improvements identified in Aumsville's Transportation System Plan.

PUBLIC WORKS EQUIPMENT FUND

We project to have \$131,280 cash on hand, which should increase to \$160,336 after transfers during the year. Under Capital Outlay \$45,000 is saving for replacement of the Vector Truck, at an estimated \$100,000; \$23,000 is on hand saving for a new street sweeper; \$2,000 of the Purchase of Equipment is planned for a gate opener, leaving \$41,500 for the future. Public Works Department staff is brainstorming on how they can remodel the shop office and lab themselves most efficiently, and researching if they can begin with the \$41,581 budget saved so far.

PARKS AND RECREATION SERVICES

PARK FUND

The Park Fund is budgeted to receive all of the State Revenue Sharing Apportionment this year. The cost of wood chips for park surfaces continues to increase. Some years, two semi-truck loads are needed, for a total of \$7,100 impact in the Maintenance & Repairs line. Budgets for the city's recreation activities have been slightly increased next year. This includes \$1,000 for the Santa Visit/Tree Lighting, \$2,000 for the Easter Egg Hunt, and \$3,000 for the Corn Festival prizes.

In Capital Outlay, the Site Improvements line item includes a much anticipated Bandstand at Porter-Boone Park, as well as installation of a sidewalk on Willamette Street next to a new parcel the City is acquiring just west of Highberger Park, which is estimated at around \$4,000. \$8,000 is also being set aside for purchase and replacement of park equipment. After transfers to the Public Works Equipment and Vehicle Replacement Funds, a contingency over 25%, or about \$34,580 is estimated to remain.

INVESTING IN AUMSVILLE FAMILIES AND CHILDREN (IIAF&C) FUND

The IIAF&C Fund continues to enjoy expanded program money as a result of the hard work from the Park and Recreation Commission (PARC) and Administrative Assistant Hofmann, through collaboration with

United Way and Ford Family Foundation grant opportunities. \$51,500 in grant moneys are expected to cover a large portion of PARC program expenses, with the remaining \$8,573 in program expenses expected to be covered by beginning cash balances, donations and fundraising activities throughout the year.

PARK SDC FUND The Park SDC Fund has a budget of \$148,425 for future park projects. A Park Master Plan update is currently underway to determine priorities and update the city vision for parks. If needed, the SDC Administrative Services line item of \$10,000 will be used to cover any remaining costs for the master plan update.

OTHER FUNDS

CITY RESERVE FUND & MAJOR OFFICE EQUIPMENT RESERVE FUND

The budget proposal includes \$2,100 General, and \$1,000 Water and Sewer fund transfer line items into the City Reserve Fund for Emergency preparedness.

The increased Major Office Equipment Reserve Fund transfers are due to an essential financial software upgrade for our court system.

CONTINGENCIES AND RESERVES:

Overall Contingency of just over 11% is less than we'd like; however we are still able to place money into reserves saving for repairs, future needs and emergencies. The important features of the budget document in connection with Aumsville's financial policies, and an explanation of the reasons for any significant changes from the previous year in appropriations and revenue items are outlined below. Your collaboration and input is an important element during this process. Our goal is to meet the financial challenges and ensure that Aumsville is developing the best blueprint possible, for city spending and prioritization of public funds investment! Including the transfers, we are budgeting \$5,942,896 for 2016-17. It is an honor to be a part of this process; please let me know if you have questions or if I can get you any additional information.


Postal Note from Aumsville Post Office

Emergency Preparedness Corner

#3 - May 2016 -- Spring weather can be unpredictable. Spring is the time of the year when many things change – including the weather. Temperatures can swing back and forth between balmy and frigid. Sunny days may be followed by a week of stormy weather. Thunderstorms cause most of the severe spring weather. Whenever warm, moist air collides with cool, dry air, thunderstorms can occur. Thunderstorms happen most often in spring and summer. Prepare your family members for the possibility of severe weather. Talk about where to seek appropriate shelters as soon as they are aware of an approaching storm. Practice your emergency plan for every type of severe weather. Show family members where the emergency supplies are stored, and make sure they know how to turn off the water, gas, and electricity in the home.

THIRD MONTH OF 12 MONTH PLAN FOR BUILDING YOUR 336 HOUR (2 WEEK) KIT:

Items To Purchase or Have On Hand:

- Canned fruit
- Any foods for special dietary needs (enough for two weeks)
- Toilet paper
- Crescent wrench(es) or utility shut off tools

Activities:

- Conduct a home fire drill
- Check with your child's day care or school to find out about their disaster plans
- Locate gas meter and water shutoff points and attach or store wrench or shutoff tool nearby
- Establish an out of area contact to call in case of emergency



Emergency Alerts - Public safety officials use timely and reliable systems to alert you and your family in the event of natural or man-made disasters. Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEAs), are emergency messages sent by authorized government alerting authorities through your mobile carrier and just one of the ways public safety officials can quickly and effectively alert and warn the public about serious emergencies. If your child has their own cell phone, you may want to explain WEAs and discuss what they should do if one is generated on their cell phone.

- **Why are WEA's important to me?** - Alerts received at the right time can help keep you safe during an emergency. With WEA, warnings can be sent to your mobile device when you may be in harm's way, without the need to download an app or subscribe to a service.
- **What types of alerts will I receive?** - Extreme weather, and other threatening emergencies in your area, AMBER Alerts, and Presidential Alerts during a national emergency
- **How will I know the difference between WEA and a regular text message?** WEA messages include a special tone and vibration, both repeated twice.
- **What types of WEA messages will the National Weather Service send?** Tsunami Warnings, Tornado and Flash Flood Warnings, Hurricane, Dust Storm, and Extreme Wind Warnings
- **What should I do when I receive a WEA message?** Follow any action advised by the message. Seek more details from local media or authorities.
- **Will I receive a WEA message if I'm visiting an area outside the area where my phone is registered?** Yes, if you have a WEA-capable phone and your wireless carrier participates in the program. (More than 100 carriers, including all of the largest carriers, do.)
- **What if I travel into a threat area after a WEA message is already sent?** If you travel into a threat area, your WEA-capable device will receive the message when you enter the area.
- **How do I start receiving WEA messages?** Some older mobile devices are not WEA-capable. When you buy a new mobile device, check with your carrier.
- **Will I be charged for receiving WEA messages?** No. This service is offered for free by wireless carriers. WEA messages will not count towards texting limits on your plan.
- **If, during an emergency, I can't make or receive calls or text messages due to network congestion, will I still be able to receive a WEA message?** Yes, WEA messages are not affected by network congestion.
- **What if I don't want to receive WEA messages?** You can opt-out of receiving WEA messages for imminent threats and AMBER alerts, but not for Presidential messages. To opt out, adjust settings on your mobile device

The key to successful disaster readiness is to choose one hour each month to do one activity... add your planned activity to your calendar as a reminder.


News from the Chicken Coop

Aumsville Historical Society met on Thursday, April 14th. President Ted Shepard presided. Business and correspondence were brought up to date. Coming events were discussed. Ted has just returned from a trip to Crook and Deschutes Counties, where he explored early town sites, old ranches and stage coach routes. He visited a noteworthy museum in Prineville.

Aumsville's museum season opened on April 2nd. There has been a lot of activity at the museum in the past few weeks. The original window sign had become brittle. They have been replaced by a local sign maker. There were two visits by "cable guys" in order to establish dependable internet access. Magic Tek's Marcie Clark brought a computer donated by Joan Miller. The donation and

Marcie's installation service are greatly appreciated. Now it will be possible to do speedy lookups for museum visitors. Another technical innovation is the new AHS website created by Jordan Pugh. It can be viewed at www.aumvillehs.com.

Sandra Hamilton of Jefferson gave the museum an Aumsville Flour Mill thermometer, which was in her late mother's effects. Businesses gave items of this type to their customers to thank them for their patronage. This particular thermometer was probably given to a customer before 1942 because the name Theodore Highberger is on it. He turned the mill business over to his son Lee in the early '40s. AHS thanks Sandra for returning it to Aumsville. Her mother was Maxine Dee Dencer. The family lived south of Salem and may have traded at the mill in

Aumsville. Sandra's great grandfather Jacob was the postmaster at the Dencer Post Office from 1889 until 1892. At that time, Dencer facility was closed and the records were moved a couple miles east to the Rosedale office.

The Next AHS meeting will be held at 7 PM on May 12th in the community center.
