OSU Extension poultry specialist, James Hermes, will be making a presentation on urban chicken keeping. He works with the commercial poultry industry as well as small commercial and backyard poultry enthusiasts. He earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in avian Sciences and a Ph.D. in genetics from the University of California, Davis.

Marion SWCD Soil, Water and Riparian Specialist, Brenda Sanchez, will be making a presentation on soil health. Sanchez has a diverse background in soil and water quality management. She attended Montana State University where she earned a bachelor's degree of environmental science in land rehabilitation.

A two year pilot program to allow chickens within the city limits was adopted by the City Council limiting the number of hens to four. NO ROOSTERS
As part of the pilot program, council asked for compliance tracking: There was 1 complaint regarding chickens within the city limits during the month of Sept. (2 total since plan was adopted)

Mayor's Message

One of the goals the city set was for their residents and businesses in our city to have 24 hour police services. One of the main responsibilities of government is to provide for the safety and protection for those who reside within their jurisdiction. In the past the city has put out two surveys asking residents and businesses if they wanted 24 hour police services and patrols. The response of those who responded was "yes" by a large majority. We have now met that goal by hiring a sixth officer, which is what it takes for true twenty-four hour police patrol. After Officer Damian Flowers was promoted to Police Sergeant, Police Officer Kevin Gollinger was hired to fill the vacanted position, and now Reserve Officer Jordan Largent was hired as our sixth police officer.

Police Officer Gollinger has a Bachelor of Science degree in Communications from Gonzaga University. He worked at the Spokane Police Department in their Reserve Officer Program. He will attend the required Dept. of Public Safety Standards and Training (DPSST) Academy beginning November 9th and is scheduled to graduate in February. At the present time, he is living in south Salem.

Police Officer Largent is married and he and his wife are having a home built in Aumsville, that they hope is ready to move into sometime in December. He has a Bachelor of Science degree in Criminal Justice from Western Oregon University; and has been a Reserve Officer with the city for a year. He will attend the DPSST Academy in February and is scheduled to graduate in June. We will then have 24 hour police coverage. It's good see another one of our goals met. We welcome them to our Police Department and the city. We wish them and their families the very best and much success.

On Saturday, October 17th, the city, with a Ford Family Foundation Grant, hosted the "Building Successful Communities Regional Planning Workshop" at the Chester Bridges Memorial Community Center. We had a good turnout of cities and their representatives, other governmental entities and some residents. We were also graced with the attendance of Representative Jodi Hack; we thank her for fitting this workshop into her busy schedule. As good city planning is essential, so is regional planning. If our cities are successful and healthy, the region will be also.

Teen Drug Use

The discovery of a teen's drug use can create overwhelming fear and concern for parents, but there are no boilerplate best-intervention steps.

Age, circumstances, the substance used, frequency of use, your child's current school status, and even your family's medical history of risk for dependence on substances can figure into an effective response.

- 1) Avoid the decision to say or do nothing. This includes minimalizing the use (e.g. "thank goodness it was only pot"), because there is risk associated with any kind of substance abuse.
- 2) Assess the situation. Attempt to discover when the drug was used, how often it was used, who it was used with, how it was acquired, how much your teen possessed, and the circumstances of use. This assessment process will probably lead you to a decision on how to respond.
- 3) Consider family goals, standards, values, hopes, expectation, and legal implications. Reflect on them to help craft your response.
- 4) Do not allow the desire to avoid conflict thwart your better judgment to intervene. Winning this inner battle comes with the territory of parenting.
- 5) Turn to professional counseling or guidance - yourself - if you are unsure how to respond or believe your intervention was not effective. This step can be a tough one, but may save years, even decades, or anguish.

Marijuana in Marion County: Your Questions Answered

In November 2014, Oregon voters approved Measure 91 which allows for possession and sale of recreational marijuana by and to adults, state licensing, regulation, and taxation. However, Marion County voters voted against Measure 91 by 51.56%. Marion County residents said no to recreational marijuana and as such, the law allows the county to put the future expansion of commercial marijuana growing, manufacturing, distribution, and sales to a vote.

We've heard from a number of residents with questions about state and local regulations; and from some who contend that decisions were made outside of the public process. Here, we hope to set the record straight about Marion County's new ordinances relating to recreational marijuana and our public process.

All meetings pertaining to marijuana regulation were publicly noticed, as are all board meetings. Current Board Session agendas and meeting material are available on the Board of Commissioners web page at www.co.marion.or.us/BOC. You can also access information from prior Board Sessions and view video recordings of each meeting. Information about other county meetings is also available on the county website on our Meetings & Events calendar accessible from www.co.marion.or.us.

On Wednesday, September 23, at our regular Board Session the commissioners unanimously approved Ordinances #1358 and #1359 which refer two issues related to recreational marijuana to the voters of Marion County in the November 2016 general election.

Ordinance #1358 prohibits the establishment of recreational marijuana operations in the unincorporated area of Marion County, referring the ordinance to the electors of Marion County. This ordinance in no way prevents any incorporated city from allowing these activities, and in fact, many cities in Marion County have already indicated that they will allow recreational marijuana operations to move forward.

Ordinance #1359 would establish a 3% tax on the sale of marijuana items by persons holding a license in the unincorporated area of Marion County and refers the ordinance to the electors of Marion County. This ordinance asks residents if they want to add a 3% local sales tax to retail purchases, if the vote allows the establishment of recreational marijuana operations. This is the maximum allowed by state law.

Neither of these ordinances infringe on an individual's right to possess, grow, or use marijuana under the rules in Measure 91. Individuals will still be allowed to grow four plants, possess up to 8 oz. at home and 1 oz. in public, and consume in their private residences. In addition, existing medical marijuana dispensaries and growers are not impacted. They are grandfathered under these ordinances.

By referring these options to the citizens of Marion County, we are able to postpone the implementation of large commercial recreational marijuana operations from moving forward in the unincorporated areas of Marion County. This is prudent as there are many unanswered questions about implementation and it is unclear what rules will come from the Oregon Liquor Control Commission (OLCC), the state agency responsible for administering this new law.

The November 2016 vote allows residents of Marion County to either confirm their will of 2014 or change direction. Ultimately, the voters of Marion County will decide. 

POLICE CORNER

In September, the department responded to 96 calls for service that resulted in reports being taken. In addition, we investigated 22 crimes with 18 arrests. These are all broken-down in table form.

During September, there was \$2160 in property stolen, \$0 damaged, \$3000 recovered, and \$55 found property. No dogs were taken to Animal Control.

Reserves worked a total of 223 hours during the month of September: 197 volunteer and 26 paid hours.




What other bus systems does CARTS connect with?







HIGHLIGHTS OF AUMSVILLE CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS

REGULAR MEETING MINUTES SEPTEMBER 14, 2015

Mayor White called the meeting to order in the Community Center. Council present were Councilors Baugh, Czarnik, Casarez, Dahl, Walters, and Mayor White. Council absent was Councilor Seney. Administrative Assistant Lora Hofmann was also present.

PUBLIC HEARING: WATER SYSTEM DEVELOPMENT CHARGE (SDC) INCREASE

Staff Report: David Kinney, Community Development Consultant, gave the staff report recommending an increase to the Aumsville Water Systems Development Charge. He explained that Keller & Associates, as part of a recently approved Water Master Plan Update, had identified much needed water improvements if Aumsville's population continues to grow. The current water system is sufficient; but there are also needed improvements to continue the sufficiency.

The total cost of the identified projects is 5.9 million dollars; 2.6 million has been identified as improvements needed for new development, and the rest of the costs are attributable to required maintenance to serve the current residents. He then explained the different projects cost attributions. After calculations, he indicated that the maximum fee for Water SDC's is \$4,486. Council has three options – they can leave the Water SDC as it is now; they can increase it to the maximum amount he provided; or they can increase it to a number in between the two.

Questions: Jerry Flowers, Flowers Enterprises, asked if there has been a water capacity study since the

one he did 10 years ago. Mr. Kinney said that the projections are based on expected water use for the next 20 years; looking at upcoming needs for the city residents, fire department and schools. Councilor Baugh gave some history about the goals that would result in increased use – he is not sure that the city will ever complete all of the goals/projects. Mr. Flowers said that the proposed \$300 increase is a "no-impact", and he agrees with the increase. He said that he is pro-city. He questioned the wording of "proportionate shares" – he wonders if that is the best wording, and it was discussed. Mr. Kinney explained the two different uses of the term "proportionate share." He used the difference between an 8 inch line and a 12 inch line. The cost of the waterline for 8 inches is the developer's cost and to take it to 12 inches is then the city's responsibility, and that comes from the SDC money. The intention is to show the need for increased funding, as part of the upcoming Master Plan identified projects within the current UGB. Mr. Flowers pointed out that if there is an upgrade, it is more than the cost of pipe; there is the increased amount of rock and the cost of digging and such. Mr. Kinney explained what Mr. Flowers is talking about is calculation of developer's share and that it's usually laid out in the ordinance and they identified Ord. 386 as the one with the city's calculation/formula. Mayor White will ask City Administrator Hills to look at the ordinance and make sure there is a set calculation. Mr. Kinney clarified that the term was used as part of the hearing notice for the SDC increase; a developer's proportional share is not part of resolution. There was further review of the

resolution to see if it has the term "proportionate share", and the term they found had to do with the reimbursement fee from SDC's to the city's total project costs. Mr. Kinney explained that it has to do with how the city and SDC's are used for a specific project. The proposed Resolution is fine.

Public Hearing closed. Council Deliberations and Decision:

Councilor Baugh said that he is not usually in support of increased SDC's; however, we are talking true safety concerns about fire hydrants; if Mr. Flowers, a developer, is not against it, he's not against it. Mayor White explained that projects are put into the visioning plan, rated for priority, and will be done as money is available. Councilor Casarez asked that staff be required to prepare a report about the possibility of SDC's coming in. If the SDC's do not come in; how will we pay for necessary improvements? He reiterated that it is a public safety issue. Mayor White explained that you have to use SDC funds for new projects, you can't just pull a number out of the air and use the money as you want. Council made a motion to pass A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING AN UPDATED SYSTEMS DEVELOPMENT CHARGE FOR WATER SUPPLY, TREATMENT, TRANSMISSION AND DISTRIBUTION, per recommendation, to \$4,486, and the motion passed unanimously. Mr. Kinney said that council can direct the city administrator to prepare a calculation sheet, so that discussions can be held about funding of water improvements if SDC's don't come in.

VISITORS: Tim Rice and Nick Olham from NW Greenlands/Recology (Recology), Aumsville.

Nick said that they had been asked for suggestions for a solution to the city's residents' request for yard debris pick-up or longer hours at Recology. Tim said that they have brain-stormed ideas, but their ideas so far have not been the best solution. They tried staying open on a Saturday for Aumsville residents only and could not believe the number of people that showed up from out of town on the first Saturday they tried it. Tim estimated that it was about 40/60 with city residents being the lesser of the two. Councilor Baugh asked if there's a maximum to the amount of yard debris that Recology can accept and there is – Aumsville couldn't exceed the maximum. Nick said that Aumsville residents are not the problem; it's out of town people bring in garbage and things that are not acceptable. Tim noted that it would be a good idea for Republic to set up a drop box, but you are still going to have to worry about garbage; and that when Aumsville residents come to dump yard debris, it is really not that much. If people have a passenger that has an Aumsville address, they let it slide; they want to provide the benefit, but just Aumsville residents – they are a business. Nick said one Saturday a month for 4-6 hours might work – and he suggested the third Saturday of the month. Councilor Dahl said maybe it could start in March – leaves are something people want to drop off during fall. There was discussion of those that want to save it up for one day a month.

Councilor Czarnik said that he wants to take the poll still to see what people want: one half-day a month on a Saturday, or pay the charge for curbside pick-up. Tim asked about a local lawn care business picking up the yard debris and they could get a small fee. Mayor White said that he would like to see how one Saturday would work. Councilor Walters asked if city agrees to curbside fee, would there be a charge to every citizen. She said that she would like to see those that use curbside service as being the ones to pay for it. She wants to be sensitive to those on a fixed or limited income not having to pay additional to accommodate a few. Tim asked if 7am to noon on a Saturday works? Mayor White said that he would rely on Recology to identify the hours. Councilor Czarnik said that of the 35 people discussing it on Facebook – 2 out of 3 said they want curbside pickup whether Recology is open or not. Councilor Casarez said that one day a month is a great place to start – we can't make everyone happy. The third Saturday is going to be what we start with. Fall clean-up will be in November and residents get one load of compost and Recology stays open for the entire day on Saturday. Recology was complimented on their efforts and improvement.

ORDINANCES & RESOLUTIONS:

Mayor White read AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 369, RELATING TO NUISANCES by title – Council moved to approve 1st

reading of ordinance by title only. Voting in favor of the motion were Councilors Czarnik, Casarez, Dahl, Walters and Mayor White. Voting nay was Councilor Baugh. The motion passed.

Council made a motion to approve A RESOLUTION MAKING A 2015-2016 STREET FUND BUDGET APPROPRIATION TRANSFER, and the motion passed unanimously.

Consideration of City Council Commissioner Appointment Resolutions: Council discussed that these documents are basically informational to council about the duties of the city commissioners, and that all positions are liaison positions. Councilor Casarez said that he wonders if there should be a discussion about whether this works. It was decided that discussion regarding this can wait for a Visioning Meeting, and they extended it.

CONTRACT REVIEW BOARD:

11th Street Storm Drainage Improvements-Phase II Bid Award. Mayor White said that council discussed this in a previous meeting and the city wants to go ahead. Council moved to award the bid to Canyon Contracting for \$48,803 for the storm drainage project, and the motion passed unanimously.

CORRESPONDENCE: Council noted the Eclipse2017.org – a Total Solar Eclipse, Mon. Aug. 21, 2017.

ADJOURNMENT: 10:02 PM without objection.
